PennDOT to Repair and Resurface a 3.24-Mile Section of U.S. 30, Lincoln Way East near Fayetteville

Base replacement and drainage work scheduled in advance of asphalt paving later this year.

Harrisburg, PA – The Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT) announced today that starting Monday, August 26, its contractor will begin roadway base replacement, drainage, and curb cut work on a project to repair and resurface a 3.24-mile section of U.S. 30, Lincoln Way East near the Village of Fayetteville from just east of the intersection with Norlo Drive in Guilford Township to just west of the intersection with Route 997 in Greene Township, Franklin County.

The \$2,651,004 contract was awarded on April 8, 2019, to Cottle's Asphalt Maintenance, Inc. of Everett Borough, Bedford County, and includes curb cut work required by the Americans with Disabilities Act, clearing drainage pipe, inlet replacement and adjustment work, roadway base replacement, removal of the top layer of asphalt within the curbed areas, resurfacing the roadway with a 3-inch Superpave warm-mix asphalt overlay, and installation of new guiderail, signs and pavement markings. Work under this construction contract is scheduled to be completed in November 2019.

PennDOT advises travelers that the contractor will not restrict travel lanes on U.S. 30 any day between 6:00 AM and 8:30 AM, or between 3:30 PM and 6:00 PM. During working hours, motorists may encounter lane shifts and single-lane restrictions with flaggers directing traffic through the work zone during daylight hours as crews conduct drainage and base repair work then remove the top layer of asphalt. Eventually crews may schedule nighttime operations between 6:00 PM and 6:00 AM, to conduct paving operations later this year.

This section of U.S. 30 averages more than 15,500 vehicles traveled daily. To avoid delays, travelers should allow for additional time in their plans or seek an alternate route.

Travelers are reminded to be alert for these operations, to obey work zone signs, and to slow down when approaching and traveling through work zones for their safety as well as for the safety of the road crews.
